

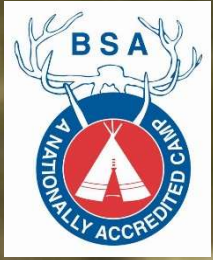

REFUNDS

Planning and purchasing for camp happens long before camp begins and is based on pre-registration. If the unit or a Scout cannot attend camp, please review the Council's refund policy and submit a refund request through our online portal, both found at www.awbsa.org/refunds.

If, for weather reasons, the camp cannot be held, 100% refunds will be provided.

ARRIVAL CHECK-LIST

Check-in begins at 9:15am. Park at the main parking lot and our staff will be there to guide you through the check-in process.

Paperwork

Please have 1 adult ready with:

- Official BSA Roster, exported from my.scouting.org.
- Mark all youth and adults that will be attending camp.
- For adults, mark the days they will arrive and depart from camp.
- Health & Medical Forms for all campers (parts A, B, & C)
- ATV Release (if taking ATV program, 14+)

SPECIAL NEEDS

If a Scout or Adult needs some extra help to enjoy the camp experience, please let us know! This includes anyone with special dietary, health, and mobility needs. Special requests are submitted as part of the registration process. If you have any questions or need something added please reach out to us.

CPAP: Electricity is not available near the campsites, participants should come prepared with batteries which can be recharged at the camp office.

MEDICATIONS: An Adult leader from your group must keep any medications in a secure, protected container under their control. A medication log sheet will be provided and must be filled out and returned to the camp medic.

ADULT LEADERS

Consistent leadership throughout the full week of camp is strongly recommended. When it is necessary, adult leaders may rotate in/out and share a single leader fee in order to provide leadership to the youth in camp. Using the official BSA roster from my.scouting.org, please notify the camp office during check-in on what days each leader will be in camp.

CAMP PROGRAM

Winter Camp offers and great balance between merit badge instruction and fun afternoon and evening activities.

SCHEDULING

Wintercamp programs are split into three sections:

- Merit Badge Classes (*50-minute daily sessions*)
- Afternoon Open Program Time
- Evening Events

FLAG CEREMONIES

The camp will assemble twice daily for opening and closing flag ceremonies (7:00am & 5:45pm). Units can sign up to lead flag ceremony at the Sr. Patrol Leader Meeting on the 27th. Scouts should wear "Class A" field uniform when performing any flag ceremony as the honor guard. Buglers are encouraged to play!

TRAIL TO FIRST CLASS

This program is for new Scouts that need to complete rank advancement. The program focuses on items that are harder for local units to complete at normal troop meetings.

ATV PROGRAM

Extra \$60. Must be 14+. Participants will complete the certification. The ATV program continues during open program time.

TRADING POST

Come visit the trading post for supplies, souvenirs, snacks, and more! **It's also a warm place to hang out!** Credit Cards are accepted.

SUNRISE SCOUT SERVICE

Join us for a Scout's Own Service at 6:30am on the 29th @ the Chapel.

BLACK MOUNTAIN HIKE

This is a strenuous hike that takes about 3 hours to complete. Units must start right at 3:30pm. Let the camp staff know you are doing the hike and they'll make sure to have dinner ready for you on your return.



ACCOMMODATIONS

Winter Camp is a rustic camping experience. It will be cold. Seasonal temperatures are normally between -10°F and +15°F. Participants will bring their own camping gear including tents, pads, sleeping bags, etc. Please plan accordingly.

- Meals are served in the HEATED Dining Hall
- Showering facilities will NOT be available.
- Restrooms will be outhouses and portables.

VEHICLES & PARKING

Weather depending, Troops may be able to pull vehicles closer to their campsite for loading and unloading. **All vehicles must be parked in a designated camp parking area by 5:30pm on the 27th.** Vehicles should not be driven into camp during the event, and roads through campsites and program areas are restricted to authorized camp vehicles only.

TRAILERS

Weather depending, Troops may be able to park a trailer in the campsite or in other areas designated by the Ranger but must not block any roads or trails. Trailers must be disconnected from the tow vehicle and the wheels must be chocked and the tongue must be secured on a block or stand to ensure the trailer is safe and secure.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

Camp Laramie Peak has written plans for emergency response such as severe weather, fire, or a lost Scout, etc. Details will be shared at check-in. Adult leaders should always carry a unit roster and vehicle keys on them while in camp in case of an emergency or evacuation.

Buddy System

The buddy system of having two or more campers together is used during camp and is important. Please ensure your Scouts use this system and that everyone has a buddy.

INTERNET

Internet service is available for adults around the dining hall and A-frame. There is some cell service in the area depending on your provider.

ELECTRONIC DEVICES

Electronic devices such as cell phones are allowed but a Scout may be asked to not use their device during program time.

ALCOHOL, TOBACCO & DRUGS

Alcoholic beverages and controlled substances are **absolutely prohibited**. Possession or use will be reported to local law enforcement. Scout Camps are smoke-free. This includes the use of electronic cigarettes, vaporizers, or systems which simulate tobacco smoking. A designated smoking area is available.

PROHIBITED ITEMS:

- Pets (Service animals must be pre-approved)
- Fireworks and pyrotechnic devices
- Personal Firearms, Air-Pistols, Bows, Ammunition, Slingshots
- Bikes / Unicycles / Skateboards
- ATV's, UTV's, or ORV's

ADDITIONAL POLICIES

- Behave in a Scout-like manner
- Do not throw rocks.
- No food in tents.
- No clothing with inappropriate graphics.
- No items which are in violation of BSA policy.
- See Guide to Safe Scouting for all policies.
